Dear GASI Conference Attendees:

I especially appreciate the presence of so many of you who have traveled from many parts of the world to join in our interdisciplinary scholarly exchange here in Seoul for the 32<sup>nd</sup> Annual Conference of the Global Awareness Society International (GASI). It has been some years since GASI met in Asia, and we are glad to come together this year at an exciting location more convenient to our many GASI participants from the nations of Asia, veteran scholars and first-time attendees alike. Moreover,

it is gratifying to meet here in Korea, where some of GASI's outstanding founders and long-time supporters have their origins. We thank the Korean people for the warm welcome we have enjoyed.

We're here to participate in a very special conference. GASI is the only organization I know that simultaneously is:

- International, for an intentional emphasis on creating new knowledge by bringing together, in mutual respect, perspectives from diverse cultures and nations across the world;
- Interdisciplinary, for the explicit purpose of achieving the broadened intellectual understanding generated by listening to each other across scholarly divides;

For the past year, she has corresponded with the GASI Executive Director on a nearly daily basis to handle all the



nitty-gritty details of the conference. Arrangements for conference rooms, meals, the post-conference cultural tour, housing for participants, and registration materials, have all fallen on her shoulders, and she has been vital in making this conference operational.

I also would like to thank the Ewha Womans University Department of Sociology, a co-host of the conference, especially Department Chair Dr. Minzee Kim. Akoto of Henderson State University, Vice-President, President-Elect, and Conference Program Co-Chair. Dr. Pomfret and Dr. Akoto have been the two driving forces whose many hours of work and whose skill at meeting every organizational need have been most responsible for this year's conference—it simply couldn't happen without them. ### KEYNOTE SPEAKER

# EUN MEE KIM, PH.D.

President and Professor, Graduate School of International Studies, Ewha Womans University

Professor Eun Mee Kim is the 17<sup>th</sup> President of Ewha Womans University. She is Professor in the Graduate School of International Studies, Director of the Ewha Global Health Institute for Girls and Women, former Dean of the Graduate School, former Dean of the Graduate School of International Studies, and former Director of the Institute for Development and Human Security at Ewha Womans University.



She was appointed by the United Nations (UN) Secretary General in December 2016 to serve as one of the fifteen Independent Group of Scientists to work on the *Global Sustainable Development Report 2019*, which was presented to the UN Secretary General and heads of member states at the UN General Assembly in September 2019. She served as President of the Korea Association of International Development and Cooperation (2011, 2012). She has served on the Committee for International Development Cooperation under the Prime Minister's Office, the Policy Advisory Committee for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and the Ministry of Gender Equality and Family. In 2012, she received the Service Merit Medal from the Republic of Korea for her contributions to the Fourth High-Level Forum on Aid Effectiveness in Busan. In 2013, she received the first research grant to a university in South Korea from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation on her research, "Advocacy for Korean Engagement in Global Health and Development."

In 2016, and again in 2019, she received a research grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for "Korea Global Health Strategy." She received the Chang-Lin Tien Distinguished Leadership Award from the Asia Foundation in 2021. She was appointed as the Vice-Chairperson of the Korean National Commission for UNESCO in May 2021, and was appointed Chairperson of the 5<sup>th</sup> Science and Technology Basic Plan (2023-2027) Committee of the Republic of Korea in December 2021. She received the Building Bridges Award from the Pacific Century Institute in the United States on February 16, 2023 on behalf of Ewha Womans University for strengthening ties between countries and peoples across the Pacific.

Proceedings papers should be submitted as **MS Word files**. Papers may not be submitted as PDF files.

Pages should be formatted with 1" margins, right, left, top, and bottom.

The font should be 12-point Arial with 1.5 line spacing. Titles, headings, and subheadings should be in the same font.

Graphs, tables, and diagrams must be properly formatted and be incorporated within the formatted text. **No title page should be included.** 

The title, author, author's professional affiliation, and author's email address should appear centered at the top of the first page. Do not use ALL CAPS for any of this information. The title should be written in Title Case (also known as Headline Style or Up Style), which is defined by the rule, "Capitalize the first and last words of the title and all nouns, pronouns, adjectives, verbs, adverbs, and subordinating conjunctions (if, because, as, that, and so on), e.g., "Rules for Capitalizing the Words in a Title."

An abstract or keyword list may be included at the author's discretion.

#### Will I have a moderator? If so, what are their responsibilities?

#### What if I need more time or have more things to discuss?

Up to 30 minutes are allowed for discussion and question time. Just like in an in-person presentation, our Zoom rooms are used for multiple presentations. When your session is over, another session will be held in the same room. Please feel free to share your contact information with attendees so they can contact you with questions or comments.

Please do not use any copyrighted materials in your presentation except what is owned by you or clearly free for use. Your presentation slides and recording will be shared online and therefore it is important that any images you use be open source and free for your use. Many sources of this kind can be found online.
