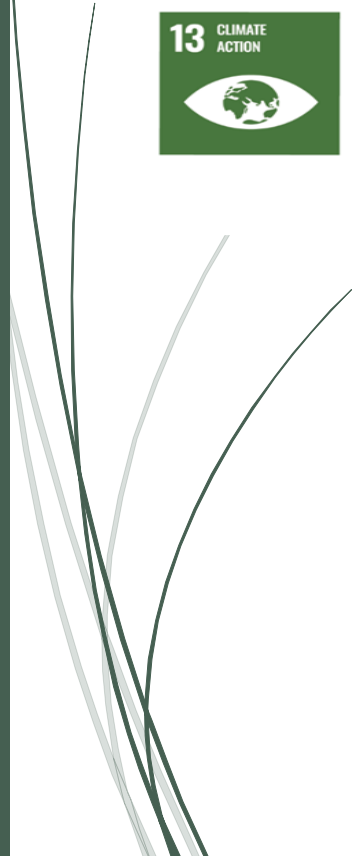

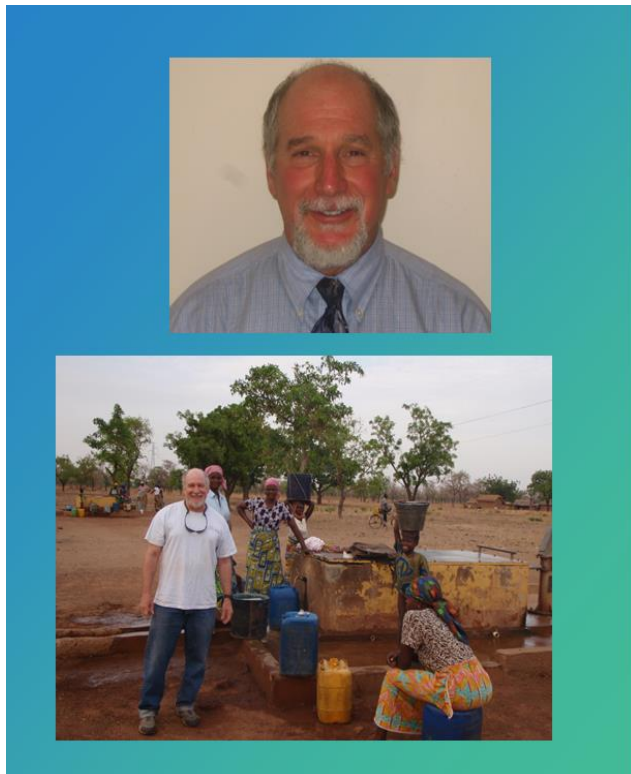

Dr. Kreamer is Professor of Hydrology at UNLV and President of the International Association of Hydrogeologists. He has given over 150 invited lectures, seminars and workshops in recent years on topics including: *Impact of Clean Water on Poverty Reduction and Equity; Water and International Security; Monitoring Well Design; Computer Modeling of Hydrologic Processes; Lake Thermal Stratification Modeling; Vadose Zone Hydrology; Subsurface Gaseous Movement; Nonaqueous Phase Liquid Pollution; Contamination from Propellants, Explosives, Pyrotechnics and other Energetic Compounds; RCRA Subtitle D and Landfills; and Groundwater Hydrology.* He has served as an expert witness and professional hydrologist reviewing several large projects.

Requirements for Submitting Papers for the 2023 Proceedings

The Global Awareness Society International will publish *2023 Conference Proceedings of the Global Awareness Society International* in online format. All papers presented, including those presented virtually, at the 31st annual conference in Las Vegas, Nevada are eligible for publication. The editor reserves the right to select only those papers and to review them for appropriate content and format.

Final Papers must be submitted by August 30, 2023

Authors should keep length to approximately 12 pages.

Papers must be submitted as **MS Word files**. Papers may not be submitted as PDF files.

Pages should be formatted with 1" margins, right, left, top, and bottom.

Font should be 12-point Arial with 1.5 line spacing. Titles, headings, and subheadings should be in the same font.

Graphs, tables, and diagrams must properly formatted and be incorporated within the formatted text. **No title page should be included.**

The title, author, author's professional affiliation, and author's email address should appear centered at the top of the first page. The title should be written in **Title Case**, (also known as Headline Style or Up Style) which is defined by the rule, "Capitalize the first and last words of the title and all nouns, pronouns, adjectives, verbs, adverbs, and subordinating conjunctions (*if, because, as, that, and so on*)e.g. "Rules for Capitalizing the Words in a Title."

An abstract or key words list may be included at the author's discretion.
